### **Chinese Canadian Librarians: Differing Perceptions of Workplace Experiences**

Among the very limited studies that involve Canadian racialized librarians, Chinese has been consistently reported as the largest ethnic group; however, there is a lack of in-depth research focused on this group. Based on the data from the Visible Minority Librarians of Canada (ViMLoC) Network 2021 Redux Survey, this study examined the leadership roles held by Chinese Canadian librarians. Those in non-management roles held distinct perspectives compared to their counterparts in management positions regarding the inclusivity of the work climate, job satisfaction, and the impact of race as a potential career barrier. These librarians encountered various forms of racial microaggressions. The findings will help Chinese Canadian librarians to understand their positions in the library leadership landscape and challenges faced in their workplaces and career. The results will also help libraries and professional associations identify the needs of this group of librarians and develop initiatives to support them to reach higher professional goals.

1:30–1:50	Development and Validation of the AI Literacy Skills Scale: Navigating the Educational Landscape of Generative AI
	This study presents the creation and validation of the Artificial Intelligence (AI) Literacy Skills Scale, a comprehensive tool designed to measure individuals' understanding and proficiency in AI. As AI becomes increasingly integral in various sectors, understanding and effectively interacting with AI technology is essential. This research aims to bridge the gap in AI literacy evaluation, focusing on generative AI, including platforms like ChatGPT. The AI Literacy Skills Scale is developed through extensive literature review and empirical analysis, assessing affective, cognitive, and social-relational dimensions of AI literacy. The scale is validated using a robust methodology, ensuring reliability and applicability in diverse educational settings. The findings of this study are expected to contribute significantly to the field of AI education, providing educators and policymakers with a valuable tool to assess and enhance AI literacy, and to prepare individuals for an AI-driven future. ## Libraries as Partners for Emergency Preparedness and Response in Times of Crisis

Multi-type libraries have proven themselves as providers to their communities during many emergencies, from wildfires and hurricanes to pandemics, mental health crises, and more. Despite libraries' history of work during crises, groups such as the fire service, emergency medical services, health departments and others may not be aware of the role that libraries can take on as partners in emergency preparation, response, and recovery. This presentation describes an ongoing project funded through an Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grant which investigates libraries' role during emergencies especially as partners to emergency response groups. The project's major activities include a case study survey of Illinois libraries and two national-level Community Engagement Roundtable discussions. It will serve as a preliminary investigation to lay the groundwork for future research and begin to increase libraries and emergency responders' understanding of how they can collaborate for increased community safety and resiliency.

# **Enhancing Student Information Literacy Skills through Embedded Librarianship**

This study explores the profound impact of embedding librarians to enhance student information literacy skills, based on a 2017 survey conducted at the University of Windsor. Findings highlight the positive outcomes derived from in-class instruction, sustained online presence within class groups, and extended office hours providing tailored assistance to students. The creation of online resources tailored to specific academic contexts emerges as a key element contributing to heightened information literacy. The survey indicates the effectiveness of this holistic approach in enhancing critical skills among students. As higher education navigates the evolving information landscape, strategically embedding librarians proves contributory in empowering students with the critical skills necessary for academic excellence and lifelong learning.
